ACE Quick Guide to Appendices

What is an Appendix?

An appendix is a section of your assignment where you include **unpublished** information, as **evidence to support your main argument**. Examples include:

- Documentation on your company's intranet
- Emails from managers
- Transcripts of conversations
- Interviews with colleagues
- Questionnaire data
- Detailed statistics
- Policy documents
- Graphs
- Models

How to Include Appendices:

- 1. Your appendices should be **labelled with a capital letter** (Appendix A, Appendix B, etc.) in the order that they first appear in your main body. If you exceed 26 appendices, continue with AA, BB, etc.
- 2. Each appendix should be **titled**. For example:

Appendix A – Test Scores of Participants

Part A	22%	45%	55%
Part B	25%	29%	36%

3. A list of appendices and their titles should appear in the table of contents:

4. You should **refer to the appendices where relevant in the main body** of your assignment, making it clear what the appendix includes:

5. A citation should accompany appendices that have been lifted or adapted from other sources. The following reflection, for example, has been completed based on an existing model:

6. Each appendix should begin on a **separate page**.
